Our campuses now offer a variety of programs and services for older adults, their friends and families, and those living in our neighboring communities. Evangelical Homes of Michigan recognizes that its commitment to "those we serve" extends beyond our residents and the bricks and mortar of our buildings. As a not-for-profit organization, we believe we have a commitment to the community at large, and our efforts this past year have addressed these community issues.

The guiding principles adopted by our Board of Directors in recent years have determined the course of our community action. The information provided in this Annual Report and the statistical information accompanying this letter defines our impact on our communities.

As we have throughout our history, we continue to offer program and service lines for those with limited financial resources. This year alone, Evangelical Homes of Michigan provided nearly \$900,000 in benevolent care and charitable services. We also reach out to our communities by providing a variety of public health awareness activities and health education materials.

To enhance our campuses, we committed more than \$1.5 million in 2005 for capital improvements. The majority of these renovations involved improvements to resident living and activity space.

Our most valued resource, our employees, continues to be a focus of all our efforts. We offer continuing education opportunities, tuition reimbursement and career advancement programs. Our employee training focuses on the importance of embracing our core values, not only at work, but at home, and we encourage volunteerism and community involvement among our employees. We work diligently to also inspire those living on our campuses to stay involved and we make every effort to provide guidance and assistance in their volunteer and outreach efforts.

- ✦ Served more than 1,330 individuals and their families by providing more than 205,679 days of care.
- ✦ Provided nearly 64,536 therapy treatments enabling more than 400 residents to return home.
- ✦ Provided more than \$892,000 of unreimbursed charity care to residents.
- ✦ Prepared more than 10,791 home-delivered meals.
- ✦ Residents received more than 9,135 hours of loving attention from volunteers.

- ✦ Contributed more than \$56,976 of financial support, material support and servant leadership to charities and community, church related and elder care organizations, including among others, the following organizations:

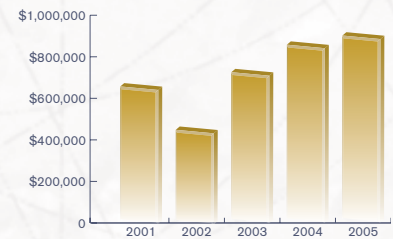

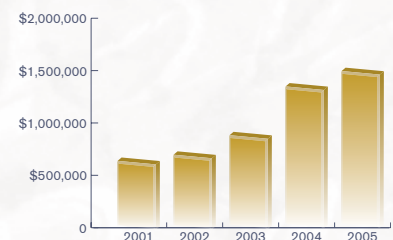


Fiscal Years 2001 through 2005
